ITEM 6 ADA CERTIFICATION SERVICES AND MILEAGE REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM

Mr. Peter De Haan, VCTC provided a brief summary of the ADA Certification Service and Mileage Reimbursement program.

ITEM 7 REVISION TO CONGESTION MITIGATION AND AIR QUALITY PROGRAM (CMAQ)

Mr. De Haan, requested that the Committee make the recommendation to VCTC approving the reprogramming of \$348,674 in unexpected balances from completed CMAQ in Oxnard, Moorpark, and Ojai, to cover a shortfall in the Thousand Oaks Municipal Service Center Expansion project.

ACTION

Kroes moved, seconded by Nestved, that the Committee approve the recommendation as proposed. The motion passed with no objections.

ITEM 8 PROGRAMMING OF CONGESTION MITIGATION AND AIR QUALITY PROGRAM OF PROJECTS (CMAQ)

Mr. De Haan, recommended that the committee take the following actions: 1) Programming of three additional project cost increases, for VCTC and Oxnard, for a total of \$671,371 and 2) Recommend VCTC approve a loan of \$1,500,000 in CMAQ apportionment to the San Bernardino County Transportation Authority, with repayment after the FY 2019/20 apportionment becomes available, and with the proviso that staff could later loan more CMAQ funds should the opportunity remain available and unanticipated changes cause the forecasted September 30, 2019 unobligated balance to remain above \$0.

ACTION

Nestved moved, seconded by Rauschenberger, that the Committee approve the programming of the three additional project cost increases, for VCTC and Oxnard, for a total of \$671,371 and approve the loan of \$1,500,00 in CMAQ apportionment to the San Bernardino County Transportation Authority, with repayment after the FY 2019/20 apportionment becomes available, and with the proviso that staff could later loan more CMAQ funds should the opportunity remain available and unanticipated changes cause the forecasted September 30,

2019 unobligated balance to remain above \$0. The motion passed with no objections.

ITEM 9 APPROVE 2018/19 FINAL PROGRAM OF PROJECTS (POP)

Mr. De Haan, reviewed with the Committee that staff recommend programming of \$671,371 for additional CMAQ projects to avoid a rescission of apportionment balances. These projects must be obligated or, in the case of transit projects, have FTA transfers approved by the end of Federal FY 2018/19 to reduce the CMAQ balance.

ACTION

Rauschenberger moved, seconded by Kroes, that the Committee approve the final Program of Projects for federal transit operating, planning, and capital assistance for Fiscal Year 2018-19. The motion passed with no objections.

ITEM 10 ADA CERTIFICATION SERVICES CONTRACT EXTENSION

Mr. De Haan, reviewed with the Committee to exercise the contract option with Mobility Management Partners, Inc., (MMP) to extend the contract by one year through June 30, 2020 at a cost not to exceed \$303,664 for the extension period, as specified in the option.

ACTION

Nestved moved, seconded by Gonzales, that the Committee approve the recommendation as proposed. The motion passed with no objections.

SUBJECT: PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AGENCY SAFETY PLAN

RECOMMENDATION:

• Information only

BACKGROUND:

The Public Transportation Agency Safety Program (PTASP) final rule requires recipients and subrecipients of 5307 funds that operates a public transit system to develop Public Transportation Safety Plans, which include the processes and procedures necessary for implementing Safety Management Systems (SMS).

The rule becomes effective on 7/19/19 and operators are required to meet the requirements by 7/20/20.

For small operators (those operating less than 100 vehicles in revenue service), the State (Caltrans) is required to develop plans on behalf of small operators or they can elect to do it themselves.

DISCUSSION:

Below are requirements of the program.

Transit agencies must set their targets on the criteria below and send them to the MPO. National Public Transportation Safety Plan (NSP) performance measures:

- Fatalities
- Injuries
- Safety Events
- System Reliability (State of Good Repair)

Plans must include:

- An approval by the agency's Accountable Executive and Board of Directors (or equivalent)
- Designation of the Chief Safety Officer (for small agencies, can have other functions)
- The documented process of the agency's SMS, including the agency's Safety Management Policy and processes for Safety Risk Management, Safety Assurance and Safety Promotion
- An employee reporting program
- Performance targets based on the safety performance measures established in FTA's National Public Transportation Safety Plan (NSP)
- A process and timeline for conducting an annual review and update of the safety plan
- Include or incorporate by reference an emergency preparedness and response plan or procedures

SMS Components of Safety Plan:

Safety Management Policy

- Safety objectives
- Confidential employee reporting program
- Organizational accountabilities and safety responsibilities
- Designation of a Chief Safety Officer

Safety Risk Management

- Process for hazard identification
- Risk assessment
- Mitigation development

Safety Assurance

• Process for safety performance monitoring and measurement

Safety Promotion

- Comprehensive safety training program
- Safety communication

Relationship to Transit Asset Management

- A transit agency should consider the results of its asset condition assessments while performing safety risk management and safety assurance activities
- The results of the condition assessments and subsequent SMS analysis should inform an operator's investment priorities

Documentation and record keeping

- Maintain documents set forth in safety plan
- Must be made available upon request by the FTA
- Keep docs for 3 years

SUBJECT:	REVISION TO PROPOSITION 1B TRANSIT CAPITAL PROGRAM

RECOMMENDATION:

• Approve reprogramming \$192,177 from the Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) Heritage Valley Bus Purchase Project and \$11,606 from the East-West Connector Bus Purchase Project, plus any accrued interest, to Gold Coast Transit for the Gold Coast Transit Operations Center.

BACKGROUND

Proposition 1B, approved by the voters in 2006, included \$3.6 billion statewide for transit capital projects, which was distributed to transit operators and regional agencies by formula. The Ventura County Transportation Commission's (VCTC) total apportionment was approximately \$39.5 million. Much of this funding was programmed through recommendations from the VCTC Transit Investment Study and the selection criteria recommended by the study. To date, Proposition 1B Transit grants have funded approximately \$3.8 million in rail and rail station improvements and \$35.7 million in bus, paratransit, and transportation facility projects. Local agencies are currently working on completing and closing out all projects.

DISCUSSION:

The Heritage Valley Bus Purchase Project and the East-West Connector Bus Purchase Project have been completed with a small remaining balance of unexpended funds.

Heritage Valley Bus Purchase Project: VCTC approved programming \$1,925,000 of Proposition 1B Transit Capital funds to purchase fifteen (15) buses for the Heritage Valley transit service and to install a replacement engine to extend the useful life of a Camarillo Healthcare District Van. The Heritage Valley buses were received and have been in use since 2015. Additionally, the new engine for the Healthcare District Van was installed in 2016 allowing the District to continue to use the vehicle for medical appointments and other necessary trips. This project was completed with a balance of \$192,177 of PTMISEA funds along with accumulated interest.

East-West Connector Bus Purchase Project: In 2016, VCTC approved programming \$148,804 to purchase a bus for the VCTC Intercity Transit Service. The bus has been purchased and East-West Connector Service has been operating since the fall of 2017. The project has been completed with a balance of \$11,606.

Recommendation: The Proposition 1B Transit Capital Program is coming to an end and agencies are working to complete and closeout projects. Gold Coast Transit District has notified staff that additional funds are needed for the construction of the new Gold Coast Transit Operations Center which is well underway and nearing completion. Therefore, staff recommends reprogramming the remaining project balances of the Heritage Valley Bus Purchase Project and the East-West Connector Bus Purchase Project totaling \$203,783 along with any accumulated interest for security improvements at the new Gold Coast Transit Operations Center.

RECOMMENDATION:

• Approve reprogramming \$15,500 and any accumulated interest from the Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) Bus Security Cameras Project to provide safety and security improvements at the new Gold Coast Transit Operations Center.

BACKGROUND

The Proposition 1B California Transit Security Grant Program (CTSGP) has allocated \$1 billion of bond funds statewide for security related transit capital projects since 2006. As with all bond measures the funds were authorized by the voters on a one-time basis. The final year of allocation of new funds was 2016 and local agencies are currently working on completing and closing out all projects.

DISCUSSION:

On October 4, 2013, VCTC approved programming \$469,972 of Proposition 1B California Transit Security Grant Program (CTSGP) funds for security cameras on VCTC buses. The cameras were purchased (8 per bus) and installed, however following installation and deployment, through regular use staff identified a "blind spot" in the rear of the buses. It was determined an additional camera (9 per bus) was needed as well as Digital Video Recorders (DVR) with more camera channels to accommodate the ninth camera. The additional cameras and new DVR equipment was purchased and installed and is currently in use. Following completion of the project, VCTC received a refund of \$15,500 for the return of the initial thirty-one (31) 8-camera DVR's (\$500 per unit).

Gold Coast Transit District has notified staff that additional funds are needed for security improvements at the new Gold Coast Transit Operations Center. These improvements include security fencing, cameras, gates, lighting and monitoring equipment. Therefore, staff recommends

reprogramming the \$15,500 and any accumulated interest to provide safety and security improvements at the new Gold Coast Transit Operations Center.

RECOMMENDATION:

• Recommend VCTC approve reprogramming a total for \$67,107 in unexpended balance from the Heritage Valley Bus Stop Improvement project to the East/West Intercity Bus project.

BACKGROUND:

In the 2014 CMAQ call for projects, VCTC approved an application from Santa Paula, Fillmore, and County of Ventura Unincorporated for \$82,500 for Heritage Valley Bus Stop Improvements. Santa Paula then moved forward with implementing improvements within that city, and was reimbursed a federal share of \$15,393. Santa Paula staff then indicated in writing that it there would not use any more of the funds, so the remainder of \$67,108 was available to the other two agencies. Shortly afterward, County Public Works stated in writing that it would not use any of the funds, and recently Fillmore did the same.

For transit CMAQ projects the unexpended balances can only be applied to other projects included in the same grant. Commission staff has reviewed the grant and concluded that another project in the grant that can use the money is the East/West Intercity Bus demonstration service which, as has previously been discussed, is in need additional funds beyond what was originally approved, due to with the higher costs of VCTC's new operations contract with RATP-DEV. Staff therefore recommends the Committee approve shifting the \$67,108 unexpended balance from Heritage Valley Bus Stop Improvement project to the East/ West Intercity Bus Service project.

SUBJECT:	STATUS OF FEDERAL CONGESTION MITIGATION AND AIR QUALITY (CMAQ) PROJECTS

RECOMMENDATION:

• Review and update project schedules.

DISCUSSION:

Under federal law, CMAQ funds apportioned to California lapse if they are not used within three years. AB 1012 applies the three-year lapsing rule to CMAQ funds in each county. It is important for VCTC to have an accurate schedule of CMAQ projects to ensure that the region does not lose funds. VCTC also uses this project schedule to ensure that the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) includes all of the projects which are ready-to-go, and to manage the county's Obligational Authority (OA).

An additional issue for FY 2018/19 is that the federal FAST Act provides for a rescission based on the unobligated CMAQ apportionment balance at the end of FY 2018/19. As a result, TTAC and TRANSCOM have approved additional projects that can use the funds in FY 2018/19 to reduce the end-of-year balance to nearly \$0. In addition, TRANSCOM and TTAC approved a loan of the remaining CMAQ balance, estimated to be \$2.8 million, to the San Bernardino County Transportation Authority, with repayment at the beginning of FY 2019/20. Due to the cancellation of the December VCTC meeting, the final action on the new CMAQ projects, as well as the loan to San Bernardino County, is on the January 11th Commission agenda for approval.

Based on these recommended actions relative to the CMAQ funding, staff has prepared the attached tables showing the status of programmed projects. The Committee is asked to review the table to ensure the information is correct. It will be important this year to make the FY 2018/19 table as accurate as possible to draw the balance down to \$0, and thus avoid a rescission, while not going negative with the result of projects being delayed to the following fiscal year. Should any changes occur in project status, VCTC staff must be notified immediately so that adjustments can still be made if possible.

SUBJECT: FTA SAFETY PLAN RULE

RECOMMENDATION:

• Receive and file.

BACKGROUND:

This past July FTA released its Safety Plan Rule which requires preparation of safety plans covering all transit operators funded with Section 5307 funds. The Rule requires that plans must be complete by July 1, 2020. However, State DOTs are required to prepare the plans on behalf of bus operators with fewer than 100 peak-hour buses, unless a bus operator volunteers to prepare their own plan. Regardless of who prepares the plan, each transit agency will be required to implement the provisions of the applicable plan.

According to the Rule, a Safety Plan must include the following elements:

- Establishment of quantitative safety targets.
- Safety Management Policy statement
- Employee Safety Reporting Guidelines
- Safety Risk Management Process
- Safety assurance procedures
- Safety promotion measures

As of yet there has been no information provided by Caltrans regarding its plans for fulfilling the requirement that it prepare the document covering smaller bus operators. Generally, in the past Caltrans has opted to only prepare federal documents for transit operators that are its subrecipients, but in this case the federal regulation appears to give Caltrans no discretion to leave

out a small bus operator that is not a Caltrans subrecipient, unless that operator volunteers to do its own. However, there may be valid reasons for a small transit operator to not want Caltrans to promulgate these items on their behalf.

SUBJECT: AB 2034 (KALRA)

RECOMMENDATION:

• Receive and file.

BACKGROUND:

This past year the Legislature passed AB 2034, Kalra, to require transit operators to provide, no later than January 1, 2021, employee training on how to address human trafficking. The law specifically applies to a "business that operates" either "intercity passenger rail or light rail stations" or "bus stations." The required training shall be for at least 20 minutes and shall be provided to all employees who may interact with, or come into contact with, a victim of human trafficking. The training is to address how to recognize the signs of human trafficking and how to report those signs to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

Based on the staff analysis of AB 2034 prior to its passage, the intent is that this training requirement will apply to all transit agencies operating intercity rail, light rail or bus stations. It is likely that the requirement applies to all bus drivers and supervisors, although the law could also be interpreted as applying only to transit employees who work in a station (such as a bus transit center) and interface with the public, or supervise those who do.

The required training is required to cover the following points:

- (1) The definition of human trafficking, including sex trafficking and labor trafficking.
- (2) Myths and misconceptions about human trafficking.
- (3) Physical and mental signs to be aware of that may indicate that human trafficking is occurring.
- (4) Guidance on how to identify individuals who are most at risk for human trafficking.

(5) Guidance on how to report human trafficking, including, but not limited to, national hotlines (1-888-373-7888 and text line 233733) and contact information for local law enforcement agencies that an employee may use to make a confidential report.

(6) Protocols for reporting human trafficking when on the job.

The law provides for noncompliance fines of \$500 for the first offense and \$1,000 for each subsequent offense. The law also specifies that the failure of an employee to report human trafficking shall not, but itself, result in the liability of the business.
