SUBJECT: CONGESTION MITIGATION AND AIR QUALITY (CMAQ) PROGRAM APPORTIONMENT LOAN TO SACRAMENTO AREA COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS (SACOG)

RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND:

Under federal law, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) program funds apportioned to California lapse if they are not used within three years. By state law, California distributes its CMAQ apportionment to counties by formula. State law also applies the three-year lapse rule to the CMAQ apportionments of each county.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) authorized the continuation of the CMAQ program for five years from FY 2021/22 through FY 2026/27. Subsequent to passage of IIJA, VCTC completed an expedited programming of CMAQ funds, selecting projects to utilize virtually all of the newly-authorized CMAQ funds for FY 2021/22. However, a significant amount of CMAQ for FY 2021/22 and earlier has not yet been obligated in grants, and since the oldest funds are obligated first, Ventura County has yet to use any of the FY 2021/22 CMAQ funds, and it appears only a small amount of those funds will be obligated prior to the September 30th close of the federal fiscal year. Since these funds are not yet scheduled to lapse, they can generally be carried over to next year, although that ability to carryover funds is subject to the risk of changes made through the federal budget process.

Although the Ventura County funds are not in known danger of lapsing, on a statewide basis there is a benefit to California drawing down as much funding as possible each fiscal year, since the state is then able to collect additional redistributions of appropriated funds from other states that could not use their share. In early August SACOG approached VCTC due to having a CMAQ project ready to use an additional \$4 million beyond its apportionment balance, and proposed that VCTC loan the \$4 million, with repayment to occur after October 1st, the beginning of federal FY 2022/23. Such a loan will allow SACOG to move forward now with an eligible project rather than deferring it to the next fiscal year.

DISCUSSION

It is in VCTC's best interest that California as a whole receives the maximum available federal funding. Since VCTC will not need the requested \$4 million in FY 2021/22, staff worked with SACOG and Caltrans to set up the loan. Due to the tight federal timeframe to obligate funds prior to the fiscal year end, it was necessary for the VCTC Executive Director to approve the loan without waiting for the next Commission meeting. Staff will bring an item to the September 2nd Commission meeting recommending a ratification of this loan.

Although the passage of the IIJA and the resulting ability to better program future years will likely result in VCTC having lower CMAQ balances in the future, one advantage to VCTC of entering into this loan is that the FY 21/22 funds to be loaned will be repaid with FY 22/23 funds, meaning that the lapse date will be "reset" one year later. Also, there have been years past when the federal budget adoption, without warning, rescinds apportionment balances, which resulted in rescinded VCTC apportionments, so by reducing the end of fiscal year apportionment by \$4 million VCTC has reduced the amount that could be taken away by any such federal budgeting decision.

BACKGROUND:

The Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) is the designated recipient of the FTA's annual apportionment of Section 5310 and 5307/JARC funds for the large urbanized areas in Ventura County including the Oxnard/Ventura and Thousand Oaks/Moorpark Urbanized Areas.

- <u>FTA Section 5310</u>: The goal of the 5310 program is to enhance mobility for seniors and persons with disabilities by providing funds that support the special needs of seniors beyond traditional public transportation services and for those with disabilities beyond that required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
- <u>FTA Section 5307 JARC</u>: The goal of the JARC program is to improve access to employment and employment related activities for eligible low-income individuals and to transport residents of urbanized areas and non-urbanized areas to suburban employment opportunities. FTA 5307/JARC funds may also be used as regular Section 5307 funds for other types of transit capital, operating and mobility management projects implemented by public agencies.

Both the FTA Section 5310 funds and FTA 5307/JARC funds are the primary funding source to support projects and strategies identified in VCTC's Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Plan, and funds are allocated by VCTC for these programs on a competitive basis through a Call-for-Projects.

DISCUSSION:

2022 Competitive Call-for-Projects: On June 3, 2022, VCTC approved the guidelines and schedule for the 2022 Competitive Call-for-Projects to allocate FY22/23 and FY23/24 FTA Section 5310 funds and 5307/JARC funds. Project applications were due July 22, 2022 followed by an eligibility screening by VCTC staff and TRANSCOM subcommittee review to prioritize project selection.

Funding Availability: Table 2 shows the breakdown of Section 5310 and 5307/JARC funds available for the two large urbanized areas in Ventura County for FY22/23 and FY23/24 with available funding totaling \$3,081,444. This amount includes prior year carryover of 5310 funds. Section 5310 allows 10% of the apportionment to be used for administration and this amount has been subtracted from the Section 5310 amounts shown below. In accordance with FTA rules, not less than fifty-five percent (55%) of the 5310 funds are required to be available for Traditional Section 5310 projects, which primarily includes capital projects.

Applications Received: The 2022 FTA 5310 and 5307/JARC Call-for-Projects was issued on June 3, 2022. Fourteen (14) applications were received by July 22, 2022, requesting a total of \$5,306,113 in funding, exceeding available funding by \$2,224,669.

Eligibility Screening: Staff screened the project applications for FTA program eligibility. Criteria included: applicant eligibility, project eligibility, plan consistency and financial feasibility. All project applications were determined to be eligible for funding with the exception of one applicant, Ventura Transit System, Inc., which was determined to be ineligible for 5307/JARC funding according to FTA guidelines.

<u>**Prioritizing Projects:**</u> A subcommittee, appointed by TRANSCOM, including two members of TRANSCOM and a VCTC staff member reviewed the project applications utilizing the adopted criteria:

- 1. Goals and Objectives (20 points)
- 2. **Project Implementation Plan (30 points)**
- 3. **Program Performance Indicators** (20 points)
- 4. **Communication and Outreach** (20 points)
- 5. **Emergency Planning and Preparedness** (5 points)
- 6. **Matching Funds** (5 points) Note: Private nonprofit organizations were automatically awarded five (5) points for match
- 7. Bonus Points for Non-Transit Operator Applicants (5 points)

Each proposed project received a final score based upon the average of the subcommittee's individual scores. The projects were then ranked by funding type (FTA 5307/JARC, FTA 5310 Traditional and FTA 5310 Non-Traditional) and each Urbanized Area's population share (Thousand Oaks/ Moorpark and Oxnard/Ventura) with the goal of funding as many of the highest-ranking projects as possible.

Based on this eligibility and scoring criteria, VCTC staff is recommending funding \$2,880,185 of the funding request for the projects as identified in the table provided in Attachment A.

Overview of Recommended Projects:

In the Thousand Oaks urbanized area, the City of Thousand Oaks requested a total of \$40,000 funding for East County Transit Alliance (ECTA) Senior and ADA Intercity Dial-A-Ride Saturday Service (CONNECT), a continuation of current service, and \$200,000 in Traditional 5310 funding to allow ECTA to lease vehicles from the contracted service provider for the CONNECT service. The City of Thousand Oaks requested funding for two additional projects including purchasing up to four (4) EV replacement vans for the City's Rideshare Program with \$200,000 in 5307/JARC funds; and \$50,000 to fund Thousand Oak's Employee Rideshare operations. Additionally, a new project recommended for funding is the Camarillo Health Care District's Care-A-Van project with \$168,000 of traditional 5310 for replacement of two (2) electric transport vans.

In the Oxnard/Ventura urbanized area, GCTD requested funding totaling \$955,785 for two projects. The Aging Accessible Vehicle Replacement Project request is to replace up to ten (10) of 13 MV-1 vehicles from the GO ACCESS fleet for \$640,000 of Traditional 5310. The Late Night and Sun Rise Demonstration Project request is to continue and expand the service between 7:00PM and midnight, and 5:00AM and 7:00AM for \$315,785 of 5307/JARC. In addition, Help of Ojai requested \$54,400 for the purchase of one vehicle with wheelchair lift for the senior and paratransit Transportation Program.

Countywide related projects recommended include continued funding for the two highest scorers, County of Ventura Human Service Agency's RAIN TLC Work Reliability Project with \$148,000 in 5307/JARC funds and Ventura County Area Agency on Aging's (VCAAA) ELDERHELP Transportation Program with \$690,000 in 5310 Expanded funds. Also recommended is the Interface 211, which will maintain and continue to develop the One-Call/One-Click program with \$224,000 in Traditional 5310 funds.

New this cycle was a request for \$150,000 for the non-profit organization, Ventura County CAREGIVERS, to provide door-through-door transportation for low-income seniors and a mobility management program including travel training and volunteer drivers, which qualifies this project for 5310 Traditional funds.

Unfunded Requests:

The following projects were requested but not being recommended for funding in this cycle. First, is the VCTC Milage Reimbursement Ventura County project (\$257,280 FTA 5310), which was determined premature for delivery and will likely be resubmitted in a future cycle.

Second, is a new request from Ventura Transit System, Inc., a private, for-profit transportation provider, for demand response service for senior, disabled, and low-income population of Ventura County requesting \$878,539 in 5307/JARC and \$1,278,109 in 5310 for a total request of \$2,156,648. This project was deemed ineligible for FTA 5307/JARC because they are not publicly owned operators of public transportation ()per FTA grant guidelines and the remaining \$1.28M request exceeded the remaining 5310 funding availability (\$81,545). Additionally, the applicant did not provide a local match with their application and the minimum local match for eligible expenses for capital and mobility management projects is 20 percent of the total project cost. As the lowest scoring project, it fell below the funding line and is not being recommended for funding in this cycle.

Recommended Project Funding: Staff recommends TRANSCOM approve the programming of \$2,166,400 in Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 Large Urbanized Area funds (Seniors and Disabled) and \$713,785 in FTA Section 5307 Jobs Access/Reverse Commute (JARC) funds for a total of \$2,880,185 for the projects listed in Attachment A.

<u>Next Steps</u>: The TRANSCOM recommendation will be presented to the Ventura County Transportation Commission at the October 7, 2022, meeting. Staff is also including the approved projects in the FY22/23 Program of Projects (POP) recommended for approval by TRANSCOM. The POP will also be brought to the Commission in October.

Funds approved through this call for projects will not be available for reimbursement until after FTA approval of the grants, which will likely occur this coming spring (Feb. 2023). Once the grants are approved, FTA regulations allow project sponsors to receive reimbursement of eligible costs dated back to the VCTC Commission approval of the program. However, although VCTC staff has made every effort to accurately evaluate project feasibility based on FTA's requirements, there can be no guarantee of FTA approval of these projects until FTA awards the grants.

SUBJECT:	TRANSIT ASSET MANAGEMENT (TAM) PLAN

RECOMMENDATION:

• Approve the Ventura County Group TAM Plan pending final comments and data.

BACKGROUND:

In 2012, Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) mandated the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) develop a rule establishing a strategic and systematic process of operating, maintaining, and improving public capital assets effectively through their entire life cycle. The resulting FTA's Transit Asset Management (TAM) Final Rule 49 USC 625 became effective in 2016 and set forth federal regulations establishing minimum asset management practices for transit providers. The final rule requires transit agencies to maintain and document minimum TAM standards, which will prioritize funding based on the condition of transit assets in order to achieve or maintain transit networks in a State of Good Repair (SGR).

The purpose of the FTA rulemaking is to help achieve and maintain SGR for the nation's public transportation assets. The TAM rule aims to have opeators create TAM plans that will help them systematically address their maintenance needs and develop prioritized asset investment plans. Well-developed asset management systems have been shown to lower long-term maintenance costs and increase efficiency and service reliability. Additionally, TAM will have important non-quantifiable benefits, such as improved transparency and accountability. Implementing a TAM system requires transit providers to collect and use asset condition data, set targets, and develop strategies to prioritize investments to meet their goals. The rule develops a framework for transit agencies to monitor and manage public transportation assets, improve safety, increase reliability and performance, and establish performance measures and targets.

DISCUSSION:

As a direct recipient of funds which passes along funds to subrecipients that own or operate capital assets used in providing public transportation, VCTC must sponsor a group TAM plan on behalf of its subrecipients. Accordingly, VCTC is the sponsoring agency of the Ventura County Group TAM Plan. The Group TAM Plan includes VCTC Intercity service, Valley Express, Camarillo Area Transit, Moorpark City Transit, Simi Valley Transit, Thousand Oaks Transit, and the small operators of Pathpoint, Help of Ojai. All of these operators are subrecipients with the exception of Simi Valley Transit which has elected to be part of the group plan.

TAM Plans for Tier II operators (operators with 100 or less peak vehicles) require the following:

- Inventory of Capital Assets
- Condition Assessment
- Decision Support Tools
- Investment Prioritization

The TAM Plan includes inventory of all assets used by the operators in the group plan as well as a condition assessment, decision support tools and investment prioritization for all assets owned by the operators.

The Ventura County Group TAM Plan is included as an attachment.

SUBJECT: APPROVE FISCAL YEAR 2022/23 PROGRAM OF PROJECTS

RECOMMENDATION:

• Approve the Program of Projects (POP) for federal transit operating, planning and capital assistance for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022/23 (Attachment A.)

BACKGROUND:

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) requires that the public be provided an opportunity to review transit projects proposed to be funded with federal dollars. As the designated recipient of federal transit funds, each year, the VCTC is required to hold a public hearing and adopt a Program of Projects (POP) which lists projects to be funded with federal funds in each of the four urban areas in Ventura County. Thus, VCTC prepares the POP using separate programs for the Oxnard/Ventura, Thousand Oaks/Moorpark, Simi Valley, and Camarillo urbanized areas, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau.

VCTC staff provided the transit operators with tables showing the calculation of estimated revenues and expenses for the four urbanized areas. Under VCTC's adopted policy, the estimated amount to be generated under the FTA formula by each transit operator's service provides the target amount for that operator's program. The transit operators were then to provide proposed programs based on the amounts of funds shown in the tables as being available for each operator. The 2022/23 POP (Attachment A) includes these programs. For agencies providing local bus service, the programming target includes the amount generated under the formula for the jurisdiction's population, after subtracting out a share of costs for Countywide Planning activities. The POP incorporates the FY 2022/23 Countywide Planning off-the-top amount of \$1,747,000 in Section 5307 funds to fund VCTC Bus Planning, Fare Collection/APC Data Management, Transit Planning and Programming, and the Transit Information Center. Countywide Transit Outreach was funded with CMAQ funds also included in the POP. CARES carryover funds of \$200,000 were not included in this POP but will be applied to Countywide Planning functions for FY 2022/2023.

Additionally, the FY 2022/23 POP includes transit related Congested Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) funded projects approved in March 2022 by the VCTC to expedite programming of available Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) CMAQ funding over the five-year program. VCTC's policy is that transit related projects receive 50% of available CMAQ funds (with the remaining 50% dedicated mostly to Bicycle and Pedestrian Projects) with the primary priority to fund alternate-fuel transit vehicles and infrastructure.

In addition, the first year of Section 5310 Senior/Disabled and Section 5307 JARC funds in the 2022 JARC/5310 Call for Projects is included with the 22/23 POP. Approval of the 2022 5310/JARC selection of projects (also on this agenda) will advance first year funding of projects into the 2023 POP.

It should be noted that the POP is based on estimates for FY 2022/23 federal transit funding; should the adopted FY 2023 Federal transportation budget be lower than these estimates, it will be necessary to make changes to the Program of Projects.

With TRANSCOM approval, VCTC Staff will present the 2022/23 POP to the VCTC for Public Hearing and approval at the October 7 meeting.

ATTACHMENT A

Program of Projects

The Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) will hold a public hearing on the Program of Projects (POP) for the Oxnard, Thousand Oaks, Camarillo and Simi Valley Urbanized Areas (UAs) for projects to be funded with Federal Transit Administration funds in the 2022/23 Fiscal Year (FY 2023). The funds available in FY 2023 are estimated to be \$1,054,127 in Section 5310 funds and \$32,531,000 in other funds for the Oxnard UA, \$519,856 in Section 5310 funds and \$15,700,00 in other funds for the Thousand Oaks UA, \$2,405,000 for the Camarillo UA, and \$6,495,000 for the Simi Valley UA, based on anticipated FY 2023 funds, prior year carry-over funds, and federal discretionary funds. The public hearing will be held at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, October 7, 2021 in the Camarillo City Council Chamber, 601 Carmen Drive, in Camarillo. The POP is available for public inspection at 751 E. Daily Drive, Suite 420, Camarillo CA 93010, and online at https://www.goventura.org/work-with-vctc/grant-opportunities/. Unless a subsequent list is published, this list will become the final Program of Projects for inclusion in the Southern California Association of Governments' Federal Transportation Improvement Program.
