Modernizing Transit Across Ventura County

Ventura County's transit landscape is undergoing a transformation.

This presentation highlights key projects and innovations, including:

- Deployment of Tap2Ride (Open Loop Payment System) fare payment for greater convenience
- Launch of RideCo Paratransit Scheduling Software to improve operations and customer experience
- Installation of new fareboxes across local bus fleets
- Success of free fare programs to promote affordability and mobility
- A regional radio project to unify communications
- Comprehensive transit stop needs assessment and infrastructure improvements



Tap2Ride (Open Loop)

- Open -loop payment is the ability to pay transit fares with a credit or debit card
- Apple Pay & Google Pay also accepted
- Cash App can be used for those unbanked
- ADA, Senior, Veteran discounts are available
- Fare capping & other products can be implemented

Benefits

- Removes "How to Pay" barrier
- Speeds up Boarding
- Offers familiar retail payment experience
- Provide seamless intercity & intercounty travel
- Partnered with BankOn to refer riders to safe, low -cost banking options

- Increase transit ridership
- Lower fare collection cost
- Provide seamless inter -city, intra -county, inter -county travel
- Using REAP funding to implement countywide


Progress Update

- November 2024 Commission approved contracts with Open loop Venders
- Tap2Ride Launched on VCTC Intercity Service on June 23 rd
- Regional agencies reviewing transit processor and payment contracts

Demand Response Scheduling Software & App (RideCo)

- New Paratransit & Dial -A-Ride scheduling system for County operators
- Included self scheduling/ordering app with real time updates
- Increased operational efficiency
- More passenger responsive system
- System provided by RideCo






Demand Response Scheduling Software & App (RideCo)

Four county agencies currently using

RideCo:

- Moorpark (MCT On -Demand)
- Valley Express
- Thousand Oaks Transit
- Camarillo Area Transit
- Simi Valley Transit (MicroTransit)
- Agencies to be determined:
 - Gold Coast Transit
 - Simi Valley Transit (paratransit)
- Feature Coming Soon:
 - Debit/Credit Card Payments through App





Countywide Farebox Replacement

- Replacement of obsolete onboard fareboxes
- New Fareboxes will allow for uninterrupted transit service
- Agencies will receive three years of tech support
- Full upgrades of backend software that organizes data


Current Farebox

Countywide Farebox Replacement

- Replacing fareboxes as buses are replaced or repowered
 - Fareboxes replaced to date: 36
 - Fareboxes to be replaced FY25 -26: 19
 - Remaining to be replaced over next two years: ~110





Free Fare Programs

- Funded primarily by Low Carbon Transportation Operations Program (LCTOP) and Senate Bill 125 (SB 125)
- Free fare initiative to:
 - Increase ridership
 - Cultivate future riders
 - Improve access to education, jobs, etc.
- Focus on mobility for youth and adults enrolled in educational institutions
- Addition of free fare days encourages first time riders, boost ridership, and reduce vehicle trips



Free Fare Programs cont.

Total ridership since inception

- College Ride (2018) 2,080,920
- Youth Ride (2022) 3,526,652
- Free Fare Days (2023) 131,655
- Over 5.7 million people served total

Challenges

- Combined cost more than what LCTOP generates
- No dedicated revenues or allowable existing alternatives available
- State budget priorities (LCTOP may get cut)

Opportunities

- Alternative revenue sources
- Work with colleges and Ventura County Office of Education
- Scaled back program to only Ventura County schools






Free Fare Program Ridership

- All Ventura County operators participate
- College Ride was popular prior pandemic, took a while to rebound and is now higher ever
- Youth Ride continues to growth on annual basis
- GCTD Youth Ride Free accounts for 37% of all trips on GCTD services

Youth Ride and College Ride Program | Ridership by Fiscal Year






Free Fare Program Ridership

- Free Fare Days (FFD):
 - Car Free Day
 - Clean Air Day
 - Transit Equity Day
 - Earth Day
 - Bike to Work Day
 - Dump the Pump Day
 - Veteran's Day*
- FY 24 -25 FFD did not include Car Free Day, Bike the Pump Day
- FY 25 26 will include:
 - Clean Air Day
 - Transit Equity Day
 - Earth Day
 - Veteran's Day*

*Not funded with LCTOP






Free Fare Program Costs

- Popularity of programs have exceeded funding
- Typically have received between \$2 -2.2M in LCTOP funds over past few years
- Disbursements for Free Fare Program were over \$2.7M in FY 24 -25 and expected to grow
- Reimbursements reduced to 75% of one -way fare in April 1, 2024









Regional Radio Project

- Funded by Senate Bill 125 funds (~\$1M)
- Implementation of Transportation Emergency Preparedness Plan (TEPP) recommendation
- Enhance real -time communication between operators, dispatch, and emergency services
- Supports regional coordination, particularly during detours, emergencies, or special events
- Aligned with countywide and statewide efforts modernize public safety communications

Regional Radio Project cont.

- Procurement of radios for transit operators (Summer/Fall 2025)
 - Replacing aging communication systems with modern, interoperable radios
- Participation in County of Ventura Regional Radio System

Transit Stops Needs Assessment and Infrastructure Improvements

- Funded by Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) Regional Early Action Planning Grants (REAP) 2.0 Program
- Focus on improving accessibility, safety, and comfort at bus stops
 - Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) upgrades
 - Shelter/seating enhancements
 - Lighting
 - Signage
- Supports first -/last -mile access and encourages ridership growth





Transit Stops Needs Assessment and Infrastructure Improvements Cont.

- Aligned with input collected during the 2022 Coordinated Plan Update and ongoing customer feedback
- Three project components:
 - Countywide Bus Stop Inventory and Assessment
 - Infrastructure Improvements
 - Open Loop Payment System Countywide Deployment
- \$3.1M allocated for implementation
 - ~\$300K for Bus Stop Inventory and Assessment
 - ~\$1.8M for Bus Stop Improvements (for procurement, design, and construction)
 - ~\$1M for Countywide Open Loop Payment System Deployment
